

A tribute to G. Raymond Rettew and the town of West Chester




The Mushroom Man Who Changed The World: G.
Raymond Rettew is the name of the documentary that highlights Rettew's life-saving discovery, which led to the first mass production of penicillin. The documentary tells the story of a man who took his work producing spawn for the mushroom industry and turned it into a groundbreaking discovery. It shines a light on his passion, motivation, and tireless work to aid the war efforts of World War II. It is also a story about devotion to his hometown of West Chester and its people; about a town and a county that came together to achieve the impossible: changing the course of medical history.
